

Cisco Nexus 1000V Software Upgrade Guide, Release 4.0(4)SV1(2)

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This document describes how to upgrade the Cisco Nexus 1000V software on a VSM virtual machine. This document includes the following topics:

Information About the Software Upgrade



If the VMware vCenter Server is hosted on the same ESX host as a Cisco Nexus 1000V VEM, then a VUM assisted upgrade on the host will fail. You should manually vMotion the VM to another host before performing the upgrade.



Any ESX patches or updates after ESX400/ESXi400-201006201-UG will be backward compatible with the Cisco Nexus 1000V U2 VEM vib (cross_cisco-vem_v110-4.0.4.1.2.0.90-1.20.19.vib).

A software upgrade consists of adding a new software version first to the Cisco Nexus 1000V VSM and then to its VEMs. The following steps describe the overall software upgrade.

- **Step 1** The Server Administrator shuts down the VMs on the hosts running the VEM software.
- **Step 2** The Network Administrator upgrades the VSM.
- **Step 3** The Server Administrator upgrades the VEMs.
- Step 4 The Server Administrator restarts the VMs on the hosts running the VEM software.



Network service for the VMs may be unavailable for the duration of the upgrade, until all the VEM have been upgraded. Because network service is not guaranteed to be restored in all scenarios until the upgrade is complete, we recommend that you shut down the VMs during the upgrade procedure to avoid inconsistencies in service availability.

About the VSM Upgrade

The following steps describe the VSM upgrade.

Step 1 The Server Administrator shuts down the virtual machines on the hosts running the VEM software.



Note

If VMs are not shutdown, there will be interruption of service for those VMs during the VSM and VEM upgrades.

- Step 2 The Network Administrator copies the new software files to the bootflash file system of the active VSM.
- **Step 3** The Network Administrator updates the boot variables in the startup configuration of the active VSM to reflect the names of the new software files. This causes the system to load the new software when reloading or rebooting. The boot variables on the standby VSM are automatically updated also.
- **Step 4** The Network Administrator reloads the software on the active and standby VSMs with the following results:
 - The upgraded VSMs are running the new software version.
 - All VEMs in the VSM domain are running an older software version than the VSM.
- **Step 5** The Network Administrator initiates and monitors the progress of the VEM upgrade.

About the VEM Upgrade

VEM software can be upgraded manually using the CLI, or automatically using VUM. VSM software can control and configure older VEM versions while continuing to support all features in the previous software version.

The VSM software can be upgraded without also upgrading the VEM software. However, the new features introduced are only available when the following conditions are met:

- All VEMs are also upgraded to the new software version.
- The Network Administrator updates the VSM feature level to the new software version.

You can configure the VSM to provide support for the lowest VEM software version installed to maintain a consistent level of feature support.



If you are upgrading VEM using a Cisco Nexus 1000V bundle, follow instructions in your VMware documentation. For more details about VMware bundled software, see the *Cisco Nexus 1000V and VMware Compatibility Information*, Release 4.0(4)SV1(2).

VMware Update Manager

VMware Update Manager (VUM) can automatically update all VEMs in a VSM domain to a new software version. The following steps describe the process for upgrading VEM with VUM.

- **Step 1** After installing the new VSM software version, the Network Administrator sends a message to vCenter notifying the Server Administrator that a new VEM software version is available.
- **Step 2** The Server Administrator sends an instruction from vSphere Client to either accept or reject the upgrade.
- **Step 3** If accepted, the Network Administrator sends an instruction to vCenter to start the upgrade.
- **Step 4** vCenter triggers VUM to start the upgrade.
- **Step 5** The Network Administrator monitors the upgrade process from the VSM.
- **Step 6** Once all VEMs are upgraded, the Network Administrator does the following:
 - Changes the support level so that the VSM supports all features in the new software version.
 - Verifies VEM connectivity with the VSM.

Manual VEM Upgrade

A manual VEM upgrade is done without the use of VUM. Once upgraded, the VSM reconnects with each VEM.

The following steps describe the manual VEM upgrade process.

- **Step 1** After installing the new VSM software version, the Network Administrator sends a command to vCenter to notify the Server Administrator that a new VEM software version is available.
- **Step 2** The Server Administrator sends an instruction from vSphere Client to either accept or reject the upgrade.
- **Step 3** The Network Administrator monitors the upgrade process from the VSM.

Step 4 The Server Administrator manually upgrades the first VEM.



If you did not shutdown the VMs during the VSM upgrade, and the following conditions are met:

- The system is now in a state where it is running software release 4.0(4)SV1(2) on the VSM.
- All the modules running software release 4.0(4)SV1(1) are reconnected properly.

Then you may use Vmotion of the VMs to avoid further service interruption while the VEMs are upgraded. This applies to VMs that do not have VSMs.

- **Step 5** The VEM reconnects with the VSM.
- **Step 6** The Server Administrator repeats Step 4 for each remaining VEM.
- **Step 7** Once all VEMs are upgraded, the Network Administrator does the following:
 - Changes the support level so that the VSM supports all features in the new software version.
 - Verifies VEM connectivity with the VSM.

Guidelines and Limitations

The following are guidelines and limitations for the software upgrade.

- After an upgrade, the VSM feature level, by default, is set to support the previous software version. Features added in the new software version are only functional after the Network Administrator explicitly upgrades the feature support level to support the new software version.
- After the VSM feature support level is upgraded, VEMs with other versions are not allowed to connect with the VSM.
- The upgrade process is irrevocable. After the software is upgraded, you can perform a downgrade by removing the current installation and reinstalling the software. For details, see the "Recreating the Installation" section in the *Cisco Nexus 1000V Troubleshooting Guide, Release 4.0(4)SV1(2)*.
- After the VSM feature support level is upgraded, it cannot be downgraded.
- Evaluation licenses installed prior to the upgrade are invalidated after the upgrade.
- After the upgrade, licenses for 16 CPU sockets are available for a period of 60 days. These licenses are used only if there are no permanent licenses installed on the VSM. The evaluation period of 60 days starts when you upgrade the software.
- If you are using a proxy server to connect VUM to the Internet, you may need to disable the proxy before starting a VUM upgrade of your VEMs. In VMware versions before VUM Update 1, the proxy prevents VUM from communicating locally with the VSM. For this reason automatic VEM upgrades may fail if the proxy is not disabled first.
- Connectivity to the VSM can be lost during a VEM upgrade when the interfaces of a VSM VM connect to its own DVS.
- Connectivity between an active and standby VSM can be lost during a VEM upgrade when the VEM being upgraded provides interface connectivity to one of the VSMs. In this case, both VSMs become active and lose connectivity. To prevent this, use the following workaround:
 - Before upgrading the VEM, power off the VSM provided with interface connectivity. The other VSM should be active. If you power off the active VSM, then the standby VSM would become active.

- Manually upgrade the VEM providing the interface connectivity.
- Restart the VSM that was shut down.



Network service for the VMs may be unavailable for the duration of the upgrade, until all the VEM have been upgraded. Because network service is not guaranteed to be restored in all scenarios until the upgrade is complete, we recommend that you shut down the VMs during the upgrade procedure to avoid inconsistencies in service availability.

Upgrading the Software


Network and Server Administrators use this section to upgrade to a new software version.

Prerequisites

The following are prerequisites to upgrading the software:

- You have a previous version of Cisco Nexus 1000V software installed in your network.
- Network and Server Administrators have agreed to a timeframe for the upgrade.
- The VSM upgrade should occur immediately before the VEM upgrade.

Upgrading the VSM

The Network Administrator uses this section to upgrade the VSM to a new software version.

Prerequisites

The following are prerequisites to upgrading the software:


- You have a previous version of Cisco Nexus 1000V software installed in your network.
- Network and Server Administrators have agreed to a timeframe for the upgrade.
- The following files are available in external storage reachable from the VSM.
 - nexus-1000v-mz.4.0.4.SV1.2.bin
 - nexus-1000v-kickstart-mz.4.0.4.SV1.2.bin
- You have saved any changes in the running configuration to the startup configuration to be preserved through the upgrade.
- You have saved a backup copy of the running configuration in external storage.

 For information about backing up and restoring a configuration file, see the Cisca Nav.
 - For information about backing up and restoring a configuration file, see the *Cisco Nexus 1000V System Management Configuration Guide, Release 4.0(4)SV1(2).*
- The VSM upgrade should occur right before the VEM upgrade.

Flow Chart: Upgrading the VSM

The following flow chart will guide you through this process. After completing each procedure, return to the flow chart to make sure you complete all required procedures in the correct sequence.

Copying the Software Files to the VSM

The Network Administrator uses this procedure to add the software files to the active VSM.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- You have a copies of the following software files:
 - nexus-1000v-mzg.4.0.4.SV1.2.bin
 - nexus-1000v-kickstart-mzg.4.0.4.SV1.2.bin
- This procedure requires you to copy the system image to bootflash. This may result in the following incorrect error message which can be ignored. The copy actually completes as expected.

Updating the Boot Variables in the Startup Configuration

The Network Administrator uses this procedure to update the boot variable names in the startup configuration with the names of the new software files. This causes the system to load the new software version when reloading or rebooting.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- You have already copied the new software files into the bootflash file system, using the "Copying the Software Files to the VSM" procedure on page 10.

- 4. boot system bootflash: system-filename
- 5. boot kickstart bootflash: kickstart-filename

Reloading the Software

The Network Administrator uses this procedure to reload the new VSM software.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

• You are logged in to the VSM in EXEC mode.

- You have already copied the new software files into the bootflash file system, using the "Copying the Software Files to the VSM" procedure on page 10.
- You have already reconfigured the boot variables so that the system will look for the new software
 files when rebooting or reloading. See the "Updating the Boot Variables in the Startup
 Configuration" procedure on page 11.
- You have made sure that the boot settings in the VM of the VSM are set so that it boots from the hard disk.



If you are upgrading dual VSMs, then before you reload the software, make sure that the bootflash file system for the standby VSM has system and kickstart image files that are identical to those in the active VSM. If they are not identical, then the only way to recover the standby VSM is to create a new one from the ISO image and point it to the active VSM.

SUMMARY STEPS

- 1. show boot
- 2. dir bootflash://sup-remote/
- 3. reload
- 4. show version

DETAILED STEPS

Step 1 Display the system and kickstart boot variables for verification. If your system has dual supervisor modules in HA mode, the boot variables are synchronized automatically.

Step 2 Do one of the following:

- If the boot variables display the new software version, continue with the next step.
- If not, update the boot variables using the "Updating the Boot Variables in the Startup Configuration" procedure on page 11, and then restart this procedure.
- **Step 3** Verify that the new software files are in the bootflash file system for the standby supervisor.

If the new software files are not present in bootflash, then the synchronization between the active and standby supervisors is not complete.

Step 4 Do one of the following:

- If the new software files are in the bootflash file system, continue with the next step.
- If not, copy the software files using the "Copying the Software Files to the VSM" procedure on page 10, and then restart this procedure.
- **Step 5** Reload the VSM.



Caution

Make sure that the boot settings in the VM of the VSM are set so that it boots from the hard disk. If it is set to boot from the CD, then the reload of the upgraded software will fail.

- If the new software version is present on the VSM, continue with the next step.
- If not, then return to Step 1.
- **Step 8** You have completed this procedure. Return to Figure 2 on page 9.

Initiating and Monitoring the VEM Software Upgrade

The Network Administrator uses this procedure to initiate and monitor the upgrade of the VEMs to a new software version.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- The VEM upgrade is started when it is attached to the VSM. During the upgrade process, VEMs re-attach to the VSM.
- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- You have already upgraded the VSM to the new software version.
- Network and Server Administrators have agreed upon a window of time for the VEM upgrade.
- **Step 1** Using the following command, notify the vCenter Server that the software on the VSM has been upgraded, and a VEM upgrade is available.

vmware vem upgrade notify

Step 2 Verify that the upgrade notification was sent.

show vmware vem upgrade status

The Server Administrator can accept or reject the upgrade.

Step 3 Verify that the Server Administrator has accepted the upgrade.

Upgrade Notification Sent Time: Tue Sep 8 17:37:23 2009
Upgrade Status Time(vCenter): Tue Sep 8 17:40:13 2009
Upgrade Start Time:
Upgrade End Time(vCenter):
Upgrade Error:
n1000v#
```

Once the Server Administrator accepts the upgrade, the VEM upgrade can proceed.

Step 4 Using the following command, start the upgrade of the VEM.

vmware vem upgrade proceed

Example:

```
{\tt n1000v\#} vmware vem upgrade proceed {\tt n1000v\#}
```

vCenter locks the DVS and triggers VUM to upgrade the VEMs.

Step 5 Verify that the upgrade has started.

show vmware vem upgrade status

Example:

n1000v# show vmware vem upgrade status

When the VEM upgrade is complete, the status is updated in the VSM.

Step 6 Verify that the upgrade completed.

show vmware vem upgrade status

Example:

```
n1000v# show vmware vem upgrade status
Upgrade Status: Upgrade Complete in vCenter
Upgrade Notification Sent Time: Tue Sep 8 17:37:23 2009
Upgrade Status Time(vCenter): Tue Sep 8 17:45:05 2009
Upgrade Start Time: Tue Sep 8 17:42:02 2009
Upgrade End Time(vCenter): Tue Sep 8 17:45:02 2009
Upgrade Error:
n1000v#
```

When the VEM upgrade is complete, you can clear the status in the VSM.

Step 7 Do one of the following:

- If the upgrade was successfully completed, continue with the next step.
- If not, repeat Step 4 through Step 6.
- Using the following command, clear the VEM upgrade status. Step 8

vmware vem upgrade complete



Note

Once you have cleared the upgrade status, you cannot repeat this procedure.

Example:

```
n1000v# vmware vem upgrade complete
n1000v#
```

The VEM upgrade status is cleared.

Step 9 Verify that the VEM status is cleared.

show vmware vem upgrade status

Example:

```
n1000v# show vmware vem upgrade status
Upgrade Status:
Upgrade Notification Sent Time:
Upgrade Status Time(vCenter):
Upgrade Start Time:
Upgrade End Time(vCenter):
Upgrade Error:n1000v#
```

Changing the Feature Support Level

The Network Administrator uses this procedure, after all VEMs in the domain are upgraded, to allow the VSM to support all of the new features in the new software version.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- After an upgrade, the VSM default, is to support only features in the previous software version. Features added in the new software version are only supported and functional after the Network Administrator explicitly upgrades the feature support level. This procedure upgrades the feature support level.
- Before upgrading the feature support level, all VEMs in the VSM domain must be upgraded to the new software version.
- After the VSM feature support level is upgraded, VEMs with other software versions are not allowed to connect with the VSM.
- After the VSM feature support level is upgraded, it cannot be downgraded.

SUMMARY STEPS

1. show system vem feature level

- 2. system update vem feature level
- 3. system update vem feature level feature level index
- 4. show system vem feature level

Verifying Connectivity to the VEMs

The Network Administator uses this procedure to verify that all VEMs have reconnected with the VSM.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- The output of the **show module** command can show either of the following VEM states:
 - **OK**: The VEM has connectivity to the VSM.
 - not-inserted(upgrade): The VEM is not connected to the VSM.

Step 1 Verify that the VEM status is **OK** in the output of the following command.

show module

The Server Administrator uses this section to upgrade the VEMs to a new software version.

Prerequisites

Before beginning this section, you must know or do the following:


- You are logged in to the CLI in EXEC mode.
- Network and Server Administrators have agreed to a timeframe for the upgrade.
- The VSM upgrade should occur right before the VEM upgrade.
- You have received a notification in vCenter that a VEM software upgrade is available.
- If you are not using VUM, but are instead manually upgrading the VEM software, you have a copy of the Cisco Nexus 1000V Virtual Ethernet Module Software Installation Guide, Release 4.0(4)SV1(2)

- If you are using a proxy server to connect VUM to the Internet, you may need to disable the proxy
 before starting a VUM upgrade of your VEMs. In VMware versions before VUM Update 1, the
 proxy prevents VUM from communicating locally with the VSM. For this reason automatic VEM
 upgrades may fail if the proxy is not disabled first.
- Connectivity to the VSM can be lost during a VEM upgrade when the VSM VM interfaces connect to its own DVS.
- Connectivity between the active and standby VSM can be lost during a VEM upgrade when the VEM
 being upgraded provides interface connectivity to one VSM in the pair. In this case, both VSMs
 become active and lose connectivity. Use the following workaround:
 - Power off the VSM connected to the VEM.
 - Manually upgrade the VEM that provides interface connectivity to one VSM in the pair.


Figure 3 Flow Chart: Upgrading VEMs with a Standalone VSM

Accepting the VEM Upgrade

The Server Administrator uses this procedure to accept the VEM upgrade after the Network Administrator has upgraded the VSM and notified vCenter server of the availability of the new VEM software version.

BEFORE YOU BEGIN

Before beginning this procedure, you must know or do the following:

- You are logged in to vCenter client.
- The Network Administrator has already upgraded the VSM to the new software version.
- If you are using a proxy server to connect VUM to the Internet, you may need to disable the proxy before starting a VUM upgrade of your VEMs. In VMware versions before VUM Update 1, the proxy prevents VUM from communicating locally with the VSM. For this reason automatic VEM upgrades may fail if the proxy is not disabled first.

DETAILED STEPS

Step 1 In the vSphere Client DVS Summary tab, check for the availability of a software upgrade.

The following message appears in the Summary tab:

An upgrade for the Distributed Virtual Switch in datacenter is available.



Step 2 Click Apply upgrade.

The following actions are triggered:

- The Network Administrator is notified that you are ready to apply the upgrade to the VEMs.
- The Network Administrator notifies vCenter to proceed with the VEM upgrades.
- If you are using VUM, vCenter locks the DVS and triggers VUM to upgrade the VEMs.
