Read the comments at the top of the Makefile, then edit the area marked 'configurable stuff'.

Edit config.h. The stuff I expect you to change is down a bit from the top of the file, but it's clearly marked. Also look at pathnames.h.

You don't have to create the /var/cron or /var/cron/tabs directories, since

both the daemon and the `crontab' program will do this the first time they run if they don't exist. You do need to have a /var, though -- just "mkdir /var" if you don't have one, or you can "mkdir /usr/var; ln -s /usr/var /var" if you expect your /var to have a lot of stuff in it.

You will also need /usr/local/etc and /usr/local/bin directories unless you change the Makefile. These will have to be created by hand, but if you are a long-time Usenet user you probably have them already. /usr/local/man is where I keep my man pages, but I have the source for `man' and you probably do not. Therefore you may have to put the man pages into /usr/man/man1, which will be hard since there will be name collisions. (Note that the man command was originally written by

Bill Joy before he left Berkeley, and it contains no AT&T code, so it is in UUNET's archive of freely-distributable BSD code.)

LINUX note: /usr/include/paths.h on some linux systems shows _PATH_SENDMAIL to be /usr/bin/sendmail even though sendmail is installed in /usr/lib. you should check this out.

Kill your existing cron daemon -- do `ps aux' and look for /etc/cron.

Edit your /etc/rc or /etc/rc.local, looking for the line that starts up /etc/cron. Comment it out and add a line to start the new cron daemon -- usually /usr/local/etc/cron, unless you changed it in the Makefile.

Start up this cron daemon yourself as root. Just type /usr/local/etc/cron (or whatever); no '&' is needed since the daemon forks itself and the process you executed returns immediately.

ATT notes: for those people unfortunate enough to be stuck on a AT&T UNIX, you will need the public-domain "libndir", found in the B News source and in any comp.sources.unix archive. You will also need to hack the code some.

This is a version of 'cron' that is known to run on BSD 4.[23] systems. It is functionally based on the SysV cron, which means that each user can have their own crontab file (all crontab files are stored in a read-protected directory, usually /var/cron/tabs). No direct support is provided for 'at'; you can continue to run 'atrun' from the crontab as you have been doing. If you don't have atrun (i.e., System V) you are in trouble.

A messages is logged each time a command is executed; also, the files "allow" and "deny" in /var/cron can be used to control access to the "crontab" command (which installs crontabs). It hasn't been tested on SysV, although some effort has gone into making the port an easy one.

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To use this: Sorry, folks, there is no cutesy 'Configure' script. You'll have to go edit a couple of files... So, here's the checklist:

Read all the FEATURES, INSTALL, and CONVERSION files

Edit config.h

Edit Makefile

(both of these files have instructions inside; note that some things in config.h are definable in Makefile and are therefore surrounded by #ifndef...#endif)

'make'

'su' and 'make install'

(you may have to install the man pages by hand)

kill your existing cron process

(actually you can run your existing cron if you want, but why?)

build new crontabs using /usr/lib/{crontab,crontab.local}

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The licenses for most software are designed to take away your freedom to share and change it. By contrast, the GNU General Public Licenses are intended to guarantee your freedom to share and change free software--to make sure the software is free for all its users.

This license, the Lesser General Public License, applies to some specially designated software packages--typically libraries--of the Free Software Foundation and other authors who decide to use it. You can use it too, but we suggest you first think carefully about whether this license or the ordinary General Public License is the better strategy to use in any particular case, based on the explanations below.

When we speak of free software, we are referring to freedom of use, not price. Our General Public Licenses are designed to make sure that you have the freedom to distribute copies of free software (and charge for this service if you wish); that you receive source code or can get it if you want it; that you can change the software and use pieces of

it in new free programs; and that you are informed that you can do these things.

To protect your rights, we need to make restrictions that forbid distributors to deny you these rights or to ask you to surrender these rights. These restrictions translate to certain responsibilities for you if you distribute copies of the library or if you modify it.

For example, if you distribute copies of the library, whether gratis or for a fee, you must give the recipients all the rights that we gave you. You must make sure that they, too, receive or can get the source code. If you link other code with the library, you must provide complete object files to the recipients, so that they can relink them with the library after making changes to the library and recompiling it. And you must show them these terms so they know their rights.

We protect your rights with a two-step method: (1) we copyright the library, and (2) we offer you this license, which gives you legal permission to copy, distribute and/or modify the library.

To protect each distributor, we want to make it very clear that there is no warranty for the free library. Also, if the library is modified by someone else and passed on, the recipients should know that what they have is not the original version, so that the original author's reputation will not be affected by problems that might be introduced by others.

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Finally, software patents pose a constant threat to the existence of any free program. We wish to make sure that a company cannot effectively restrict the users of a free program by obtaining a restrictive license from a patent holder. Therefore, we insist that any patent license obtained for a version of the library must be consistent with the full freedom of use specified in this license.

Most GNU software, including some libraries, is covered by the ordinary GNU General Public License. This license, the GNU Lesser General Public License, applies to certain designated libraries, and is quite different from the ordinary General Public License. We use this license for certain libraries in order to permit linking those libraries into non-free programs.

When a program is linked with a library, whether statically or using a shared library, the combination of the two is legally speaking a combined work, a derivative of the original library. The ordinary General Public License therefore

permits such linking only if the entire combination fits its criteria of freedom. The Lesser General Public License permits more lax criteria for linking other code with the library.

We call this license the "Lesser" General Public License because it does Less to protect the user's freedom than the ordinary General Public License. It also provides other free software developers Less of an advantage over competing non-free programs. These disadvantages are the reason we use the ordinary General Public License for many libraries. However, the Lesser license provides advantages in certain special circumstances.

For example, on rare occasions, there may be a special need to encourage the widest possible use of a certain library, so that it becomes a de-facto standard. To achieve this, non-free programs must be allowed to use the library. A more frequent case is that a free library does the same job as widely used non-free libraries. In this case, there is little to gain by limiting the free library to free software only, so we use the Lesser General Public License.

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Although the Lesser General Public License is Less protective of the users' freedom, it does ensure that the user of a program that is linked with the Library has the freedom and the wherewithal to run that program using a modified version of the Library.

The precise terms and conditions for copying, distribution and modification follow. Pay close attention to the difference between a "work based on the library" and a "work that uses the library". The former contains code derived from the library, whereas the latter must be combined with the library in order to run.

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A "library" means a collection of software functions and/or data prepared so as to be conveniently linked with application programs (which use some of those functions and data) to form executables.

The "Library", below, refers to any such software library or work which has been distributed under these terms. A "work based on the Library" means either the Library or any derivative work under copyright law: that is to say, a work containing the Library or a portion of it, either verbatim or with modifications and/or translated straightforwardly into another language. (Hereinafter, translation is included without limitation in the term "modification".)

"Source code" for a work means the preferred form of the work for making modifications to it. For a library, complete source code means all the source code for all modules it contains, plus any associated interface definition files, plus the scripts used to control compilation and installation of the library.

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You may charge a fee for the physical act of transferring a copy, and you may at your option offer warranty protection in exchange for a fee.

2. You may modify your copy or copies of the Library or any portion of it, thus forming a work based on the Library, and copy and distribute such modifications or work under the terms of Section 1 above, provided that you also meet all of these conditions:

- a) The modified work must itself be a software library.
- b) You must cause the files modified to carry prominent notices stating that you changed the files and the date of any change.
- c) You must cause the whole of the work to be licensed at no charge to all third parties under the terms of this License.
- d) If a facility in the modified Library refers to a function or a table of data to be supplied by an application program that uses the facility, other than as an argument passed when the facility is invoked, then you must make a good faith effort to ensure that, in the event an application does not supply such function or table, the facility still operates, and performs whatever part of its purpose remains meaningful.

(For example, a function in a library to compute square roots has a purpose that is entirely well-defined independent of the application. Therefore, Subsection 2d requires that any application-supplied function or table used by this function must be optional: if the application does not supply it, the square root function must still compute square roots.)

These requirements apply to the modified work as a whole. If identifiable sections of that work are not derived from the Library, and can be reasonably considered independent and separate works in themselves, then this License, and its terms, do not apply to those sections when you distribute them as separate works. But when you distribute the same sections as part of a whole which is a work based on the Library, the distribution of the whole must be on the terms of this License, whose permissions for other licensees extend to the entire whole, and thus to each and every part regardless of who wrote it.

Thus, it is not the intent of this section to claim rights or contest your rights to work written entirely by you; rather, the intent is to exercise the right to control the distribution of derivative or collective works based on the Library.

In addition, mere aggregation of another work not based on the Library with the Library (or with a work based on the Library) on a volume of a storage or distribution medium does not bring the other work under the scope of this License.

3. You may opt to apply the terms

of the ordinary GNU General Public License instead of this License to a given copy of the Library. To do this, you must alter all the notices that refer to this License, so that they refer to the ordinary GNU General Public License, version 2, instead of to this License. (If a newer version than version 2 of the ordinary GNU General Public License has appeared, then you can specify that version instead if you wish.) Do not make any other change in these notices.

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Once this change is made in a given copy, it is irreversible for that copy, so the ordinary GNU General Public License applies to all subsequent copies and derivative works made from that copy.

This option is useful when you wish to copy part of the code of the Library into a program that is not a library.

4. You may copy and distribute the Library (or a portion or derivative of it, under Section 2) in object code or executable form under the terms of Sections 1 and 2 above provided that you accompany it with the complete corresponding machine-readable source code, which must be distributed under the terms of Sections 1 and 2 above on a medium customarily used for software interchange.

If distribution of object code is made by offering access to copy from a designated place, then offering equivalent access to copy the source code from the same place satisfies the requirement to distribute the source code, even though third parties are not compelled to copy the source along with the object code.

5. A program that contains no derivative of any portion of the Library, but is designed to work with the Library by being compiled or linked with it, is called a "work that uses the Library". Such a work, in isolation, is not a derivative work of the Library, and therefore falls outside the scope of this License.

However, linking a "work that uses the Library" with the Library creates an executable that is a derivative of the Library (because it contains portions of the Library), rather than a "work that uses the library". The executable is therefore covered by this License. Section 6 states terms for distribution of such executables.

When a "work that uses the Library" uses material from a header file that is part of the Library, the object code for the work may be a derivative work of the Library even though the source code is not. Whether this is true is especially significant if the work can be linked without the Library, or if the work is itself a library. The

threshold for this to be true is not precisely defined by law.

Otherwise, if the work is a derivative of the Library, you may distribute

the object code for the work under the terms of Section 6.

Any executables containing that work also fall under Section 6, whether or not they are linked directly with the Library itself.

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6. (It is understood that the user who changes the contents of definitions files in the Library will not necessarily be able to recompile the application to use the modified definitions.)

b) Use a suitable shared library mechanism for linking with the Library. A suitable mechanism is one that (1) uses at run time a copy of the library already present on the user's computer system, rather than copying library functions into the executable, and (2)

File::FcntlLock is a module to do file locking in an object oriented fashion using the fcntl(2) system call. This allows locks on parts of a file as well as on the whole file and overcomes some known problems with flock(2), on which Perls flock() function is based per default.

Since version 0.15 there three slightly different ways this can be done with using this package. Per default a method is used where a shared library build creation of the package is called from the Perl code to invoke the fcntl(2) system function. This method can also be used by employing the File::FcntlLock::XS module (which basically an alias for File::FcntlLock). Two further methods instead use calls of the Perl fcntl() function. In both cases at some time a C program must be run to determine the binary layout of the C flock struct used by fcntl() for locking. For the one package, File::FcntlLock::Pure, this is done while making the package. For the other, File::FcntlLock::Inline, this

happens each time the package is loaded (e.g. with the 'use' function). Of course, for this to work a C compiler must be installed on the system!

Unfortunately, there seem to be a few 32-bit systems where the `off_t` type, used in the flock struct, is a 64-bit integer but which use a Perl version that hasn't 64-bit support enabled. On these systems the 'q' format for Perl's `pack()` and `unpack()` function isn't available and thus a "pure Perl" approach is thus not possible. On such systems the `File::FcntlLock::Pure` and `File::FcntlLock::Inline` modules won't get installed.

PORTABILITY

To use the module the system must support the `fcntl()` system call which probably will restrict its use to POSIX compliant systems.

INSTALLATION

To install this module type the following:

DEPENDENCIES

The module requires the following other modules:

POSIX, Errno, Carp,
Exporter, DynaLoader

To install the module(s) a C compiler must be available and the system must support the use of shared libraries (or DLLs). For `File::FcntlFlock::Inline` the C compiler must also be available when the module is used. The installation of the `File::FcntlLock::Pure` and `File::FcntlLock::Inline` modules require that the Perl `pack()` and `unpack()` function support the 'q' format if the `off_t` type on the system is 64-bit wide.

=head1 DESCRIPTION

File locking in Perl is usually done using the C<flock> function. Unfortunately, this only allows locks on whole files and is often implemented in terms of the L<flock(2)> system function which has some shortcomings (especially concerning locks on remotely mounted file systems) and slightly different behaviour than L<fcntl(2)>.

Using this module file locking via L<fcntl(2)> can be done (obviously, this restricts the use of the module to systems that have a L<fcntl(2)> system call). Before a file (or parts of a file) can be locked, an object simulating a flock structure, containing information in a binary format to be passed to L<fcntl(2)> for locking requests, must be created and its properties set. Afterwards, by calling the L<lock(> method a lock can be set and removed or it can be determined if and which process currently holds the lock.

File::FcntlLock (or its alias File::FcntlLock::XS) uses a shared library, build during installation, to call the L<fcntl(2)> system function directly. If this is unsuitable there are two alternatives, File::FcntlLock::Pure and File::FcntlLock::Inline. Both call the Perl C<fcntl> function instead and use Perl code to assemble and disassemble the structure. For this at some time the (system-dependent) binary layout of the flock structure must have been determined via a program written in C. The difference between File::FcntlLock::Pure and File::FcntlLock::Inline is that for the former this happened when the package is installed while for the latter it is done each time the package is loaded (e.g., with C<use>). Thus, for File::FcntlLock::Inline to work a C compiler must be available. There are some minor differences in the functionality and the behaviour on passing the method for locking invalid arguments to be described below.

=head2 Creating objects

=over 4

=item C<new()>

To create a new object, representing a flock structure, call L<new()>:

```
$fs = new File::FcntlLock;
```

The object has a number of properties, reflecting the members of the flock structure to be passed to L<fcntl(2)> (see below). Per default on object creation the L<l_type> property is set to C<F_RDLCK>, L<l_whence> to C<SEEK_SET>, and both L<l_start> and L<l_len> to 0, i.e., the settings for a read lock on the whole file.

These defaults can be overruled by passing the L<new()> method a set of key-value pairs to initialize the objects properties, e.g. use

if you intend to obtain a write lock for the first 100 bytes of a file.

=head2 Object properties

Once the object simulating the flock structure has been created the following methods allow to query and, in most cases, to also modify its properties.

=over 4

=item C<l_type()>

If called without an argument the method returns the current setting of the lock type, otherwise the lock type is set to the argument's value which must be either C<F_RDLCK>, C<F_WRLCK> or C<F_UNLCK> (for read lock, write lock or unlock).

=item C<l_whence()>

This method sets, when called with an argument, the L<l_whence>

property of the flock object, determining if the L<l_start> value is relative to the start of the file, to the current position in the file or to the end of the file. These values are C<SEEK_SET>, C<SEEK_CUR> and C<SEEK_END> (also see the man page for L<lseek(2)>). If called with no argument the current value of the property is returned.

=item C<l_start()>

Queries or sets the start position (offset) of the lock in the file according to the mode selected by the L<l_whence> member. See also the man page for L<lseek(2)>.

=item C<l_len()>

Queries or sets the length of the region (in bytes) in the file to be locked. A value of 0 is interpreted to mean a lock, starting at C<l_start>, to the end of the file. E.g., a lock obtained with L<l_whence> set to C<SEEK_SET> and both L<l_start> and L<l_len> set to 0 locks the complete file.

According to SUSv3 support for negative values for L<l_len> are permitted, resulting in a lock ranging from C<l_start+l_len> up to and including C<l_start-1>. But not all systems support negative values for L<l_len> and will return an error when you try to obtain such a lock, so please read the L<fcntl(2)> man page of the system carefully for details.

=item C<l_pid()>

If a call of the L<lock()> method with C<F_GETLK> indicates that another process is holding the lock (in which case the L<l_type> property will be either C<F_WRLCK> or C<F_RDLCK>) a call of the L<l_pid()> method returns the PID of the process holding the lock. This method does not accept any arguments.

=back

=head2 Locking

After having set up the object representing a flock structure one can then try to obtain a lock, release it or determine the current holder of the lock by invoking the L<lock()> method:

=over 4

=item C<lock()>

This method expects two arguments. The first one is a file handle (or typeglob). File::FcntlLock, and thus File::FcntlLock::XS (B<but neither> File::FcntlLock::Pure B<nor> File::FcntlLock::Inline), also accepts a "raw" integer file descriptor. The second argument is a flag indicating the action to be taken. So call it as in

$fs->lock( $fh, F_SETLK );
```

There are three values that can be used as the second argument:

=over 4

=item C<F_SETLK>

With C<F_SETLK> the L<lock()> method tries to obtain a lock (when L<l_type> is set to either C<F_WRLCK> or C<F_RDLCK>) or releases it (if L<l_type> is set to C<F_UNLCK>). If an attempt is made to obtain a lock but a lock is already being held by some other process the method returns C<undef> and C<errno> is set to C<EACCESS> or C<EAGAIN> (please see the the man page for L<fcntl(2)> for more details).

=item C<F_SETLKW>

is similar to C<F_SETLK>, but instead of returning an error if the lock can't be obtained immediately it puts the calling process to sleep, i.e., it blocks, until the lock is obtained at some later time. If a signal is received while waiting for the lock the method returns C<undef> and C<errno> is set to C<EINTR>.

=item C<F_GETLK>

With C<F_GETLK> the L<lock()> method determines if and which process currently is holding the lock. If there's no other lock the L<l_type> property will be set to C<F_UNLCK>. Otherwise the flock structure object is set to the values that would prevent us from obtaining a lock. There may be several processes that keep us from getting a lock, including some that themselves are blocked waiting to obtain a lock. C<F_GETLK> will only make details of one of these processes visible, and one has no control over which process this is.

=back

On success the L<lock()> method returns the string "0 but true",

i.e., a value that is true in boolean but 0 in numeric context. If the method fails (as indicated by an C<undef> return value) you can either immediately evaluate the error number (using \$!, \$ERRNO or \$OS_ERROR) or check for it via the methods discussed below at some later time.

=back

=head2 Error handling

There are minor differences between File::FcntlLock on the one hand and File::FcntlLock::Pure and File::FcntlLock::Inline on the other, due to the first calling the system function L<fcntl(2)> directly while the latter two invoke the Perl C<fcntl> function. Perl's C<fcntl> function already returns a Perl error on some types of invalid arguments. In contrast File::FcntlLock passes them on to the L<fcntl(2)> system call and then returns the systems response to the caller.

There are three methods for obtaining information about the reason the a call of the L<lock()> method failed:

=over 4

=item C<lock_errno()>

Returns the C<errno> error number from the latest call of L<lock()>. If the last call did not result in an error C<undef> is returned.

=item C<error()>

Returns a short description of the error that happened during the latest call of L<lock()>. Please take the messages with a grain of salt, they represent what SUSv3 (IEEE 1003.1-2001) and the Linux, TRUE64, OpenBSD3 and Solaris8 man pages tell what the error numbers mean. A messages is logged each time a command is executed; also, the files

For a C<static> function, use:

```
#define NEED_function
```

For a global function, use:

```
#define NEED_function_GLOBAL
```

Note that you mustn't have more than one global request for one function in your project.

To avoid namespace conflicts, you can change the namespace of the explicitly exported functions using the `C<DPPP_NAMESPACE>` macro. Just `C<#define>` the macro before including `C<ppport.h>`:

```
#define DPPP_NAMESPACE MyOwnNamespace_
#include "ppport.h"
```

The default namespace is `C<DPPP_>`.

=back

The good thing is that most of the above can be checked by running `F<ppport.h>` on your source code. See the next section for details.

=head1 EXAMPLES

To verify whether `F<ppport.h>` is needed for your module, whether you should make any changes to your code, and whether any special defines should be used, `F<ppport.h>` can be run as a Perl script to check your source code. Simply say:

```
perl ppport.h
```

The result will usually be a list of patches suggesting changes that should at least be acceptable, if not necessarily the most efficient solution, or a fix for all possible problems.

If you know that your XS module uses features only available in

newer Perl releases,
if you're aware that it uses C++ comments,
and if you want all suggestions as a single patch file, you could
use something like this:

```
perl ppport.h --compat-version=5.6.0 --cplusplus --patch=test.diff
```

If you only want your code to be scanned without any suggestions
for changes, use:

```
perl ppport.h --nochanges
```

You can specify a different C<diff> program or options, using
the C<--diff> option:

```
perl ppport.h --diff='diff -C 10'
```

This would output context diffs with 10 lines of context.

To display portability information for the C<newSVpv< function,
use:

```
perl ppport.h --api-info=newSVpv<
```

Since the argument to C<--api-info> can be a regular expression,
you can use

```
perl ppport.h --api-info=/_nomg$/
```

to display portability information for all C<_nomg> functions or

```
perl ppport.h --api-info=./
```

to display information for all known API elements.

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The reason we have a separate public license for some libraries is that they blur the distinction we usually make between modifying or adding to a program and simply using it. Linking a program with a library, without changing the library, is in some sense simply using the library, and is analogous to running a utility program or application program. However, in a textual and legal sense, the linked executable is a combined work, a

derivative of the original library, and the ordinary General Public License treats it as such.

Because of this blurred distinction, using the ordinary General Public License for libraries did not effectively promote software sharing, because most developers did not use the libraries. We concluded that weaker conditions might promote sharing better.

However, unrestricted linking of non-free programs would deprive the users of those programs of all benefit from the free status of the libraries themselves. This Library General Public License is intended to permit developers of non-free programs to use free libraries, while preserving your freedom as a user of such programs to change the free libraries that are incorporated in them. (We have not seen how to achieve this as regards changes in header files, but we have achieved it as regards changes in the actual functions of the Library.) The hope is that this will lead to faster development of free libraries.

=head1 INTRODUCTION

(by
Mark-Jason Dominus)

I once read an article written by the authors of C<diff>; they said that they worked very hard on the algorithm until they found the right one.

I think what they ended up using (and I hope someone will correct me, because I am not very confident about this) was the 'longest common subsequence' method. In the LCS problem, you have two sequences of items:

```
a b c d f g h j q z
```

```
a b c d e f g i j k r x y z
```

and you want to find the longest sequence of items that is present in both original sequences in the same order. That is, you want to find a new sequence I<S> which can be obtained from the first sequence by deleting some items, and from the second sequence by deleting other items. You also want I<S> to be as long as possible. In this case I<S> is

```
a b c d f g j z
```

From there it's only a small step to get diff-like output:

```
e h i k q r x y
+ - + + - + + +
```

This module solves the LCS problem. It also includes a canned function to generate C<diff>-like output.

It might seem from the example above that the LCS of two sequences is always pretty obvious, but that's not always the case, especially when the two sequences have many repeated elements. For example, consider

```
a x b y c z p d q
```

a b c a x b y c z

A naive approach might start by matching up the C<a> and C that appear at the beginning of each sequence, like this:

```
a x b y c      z p d q
a  b  c a b y c z
```

This finds the common subsequence C<a b c z>. But actually, the LCS is C<a x b y c z>:

```
  a x b y c z p d q
a b c a x b y c z
```

or

```
a  x b y c z p d q
a b c a x b y c z
```

=head1 USAGE

(See also the README file and several example scripts include with this module.)

This module now provides an object-oriented interface that uses less memory and is easier to use than most of the previous procedural interfaces. It also still provides several exportable functions. We'll deal with these in ascending order of difficulty: C<LCS>, C<LCS_length>, C<LCSidx>, OO interface, C<prepare>, C<diff>, C<sdiff>, C<traverse_sequences>, and C<traverse_balanced>.

=head2 C<LCS>

Given references to two lists of items, LCS returns an array containing their longest common subsequence. In scalar context, it returns a reference to such a list.

@lcs = LCS( \@seq1, \@seq2 );
$lcsref = LCS( \@seq1, \@seq2 );
```

C<LCS> may be passed an optional third parameter; this is a CODE reference to a key generation function. See L</KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS>.

```
@lcs = LCS( \@seq1, \@seq2, \&keyGen, @args );
$lcsref = LCS( \@seq1, \@seq2, \&keyGen, @args );
```

Additional parameters, if any, will be passed to the key generation routine.

```
=head2 C<LCS_length>
```

This is just like C<LCS> except it only returns the length of the longest common subsequence. This provides a performance gain of about 9% compared to C<LCS>.

```
=head2 C<LCSidx>
```

Like C<LCS> except it returns references to two arrays. The first array contains the indices into @seq1 where the LCS items are located. The second array contains the indices into @seq2 where the LCS items are located.

Therefore, the following three lists will contain the same values:

C<new> computes the smallest set of additions and deletions necessary to turn the first sequence into the second and compactly records them in the object.

You use the object to iterate over I<hunks>, where each hunk represents a contiguous section of items which should be added, deleted, replaced, or left unchanged.

The following summary of all of the methods looks a lot like Perl code but some of the symbols have different meanings:

C<Next> moves the object to point at the next hunk. The object starts out "reset", which means it isn't pointing at any hunk. If the object is reset, then C<Next()> moves to the first hunk.

C<Next> returns a true value iff the move didn't go past the last hunk. So C<Next(0)> will return true iff the object is not reset.

Actually, C<Next> returns the object's new position, which is a number between 1 and the number of hunks (inclusive), or returns a false value.

```

=item C<Prev>

```

C<Prev(\$N)> is almost identical to C<Next(-\$N)>; it moves to the \$Nth previous hunk. On a 'reset' object, C<Prev()> [and C<Next(-1)>] move to the last hunk.

The position returned by C<Prev> is relative to the I<end> of the hunks; -1 for the last hunk, -2 for the second-to-last, etc.

```

=item C<Reset>

```

C<Reset> returns the object, so, for example, you could use
C<< \$diff->Reset()->Next(-1) >> to get the number of hunks.

=item C<Copy>

C<Copy> returns a copy of the object. The copy and the original object share most of their data, so making copies takes very little memory. The copy maintains its own position (separate from the original), which is the main purpose of copies. It also maintains its own base.

By default, the copy's position starts out the same as the original object's position. But C<Copy> takes an optional first argument to set the new position, so the following three snippets are equivalent:

$copy = $diff->Copy($pos);

$copy = $diff->Copy()->Reset($pos);

C<Copy> takes an optional second argument to set the base for the copy. If you wish to change the base of the copy but leave the position the same as in the original, here are two equivalent ways:

Here are two equivalent way to get a "reset" copy:

C<Diff> returns a true value iff the current hunk contains items that are different between the two sequences. It actually returns one of the follow 4 values:

C<3==(1|2)>. This hunk contains items from @seq1 and the items from @seq2 that should replace them. Both sequence 1 and 2 contain changed items so both the 1 and 2 bits are set.

This hunk only contains items from @seq2 that should be inserted (not items from @seq1). Only sequence 2 contains changed items so only the 2 bit is set.

This hunk only contains items from @seq1 that should be deleted (not items from @seq2). Only sequence 1 contains changed items so only the 1 bit is set.

This means that the items in this hunk are the same in both sequences. Neither sequence 1 nor 2 contain changed items so neither the 1 nor the 2 bits are set.

C<Same> returns a true value iff the current hunk contains items that are the same in both sequences. It actually returns the list of items if they are the same or an empty list if they aren't. In a scalar context, it returns the size of the list.

If the hunk contains replacements,

Otherwise, the hunk contains identical items and all of the following will return the same lists:

`C<Base>` sets and/or returns the current base (usually 0 or 1) that is used when you request range information. The base defaults to 0 so that range information is returned as array indices. You can set the

C<Get> returns one or more scalar values. You pass in a list of the names of the values you want returned. Each name must match one of the following regexes:

/(?range[12]|same|diff|base)$/i
```

The 1 or 2 after a name says which sequence you want the information for (and where allowed, it is required). The optional number before "min" or "max" is the base to use. So the following equalities hold:

$diff->Get('min1') == $diff->Min(1)
$diff->Get('0min2') == $diff->Min(2,0)
```

Using C<Get> in a scalar context when you've passed in more than one name is a fatal error (C<die> is called).

=back

=head2 C<prepare>

Given a reference to a list of items, C<prepare> returns a reference to a hash which can be used when comparing this sequence to other sequences with C<LCS> or C<LCS_length>.

$prep = prepare( \@seq1 );
for $i ( 0 .. 10_000 )
{
```

    @lcs = LCS( $prep, $seq[$i] );
    # do something useful with @lcs
}

```

C<prepare> may be passed an optional third parameter; this is a CODE reference to a key generation function. See L<KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS>.

```

$prep = prepare( \@seq1, \&keyGen );
for $i (
0 .. 10_000 )
{
    @lcs = LCS( $seq[$i], $prep, \&keyGen );
    # do something useful with @lcs
}

```

Using C<prepare> provides a performance gain of about 50% when calling LCS many times compared with not preparing.

=head2 C<diff>

```

@diffs = diff( \@seq1, \@seq2 );
$diffs_ref = diff( \@seq1, \@seq2 );

```

C<diff> computes the smallest set of additions and deletions necessary to turn the first sequence into the second, and returns a description of these changes. The description is a list of I<hunks>; each hunk represents a contiguous section of items which should be added, deleted, or replaced. (Hunks containing unchanged items are not included.)

The return value of C<diff> is a list of hunks, or, in scalar context, a reference to such a list. If there are no differences, the list will be empty.

Here is an example. Calling C<diff> for the following two sequences:

```

a b c e h j l m n p
b c d e f j k l m r s t

```

would produce the following list:

```

(
  [ [ '-', 0, 'a' ] ],
  [ [ '+', 2, 'd' ] ],
  [ [ '-', 4, 'h' ] ],

```

```

    [ '+', 4, 'f' ] ],

  [ [ '+', 6, 'k' ] ],

  [ [ '-', 8, 'n' ],
    [ '-', 9, 'p' ],
    [ '+', 9, 'r' ],
    [ '+', 10, 's' ],
    [ '+', 11, 't' ] ],
)

```

There are five hunks here. The first hunk says that the C<a> at position 0 of the first sequence should be deleted (C<->). The second hunk says that the C<d> at position 2 of the second sequence should be inserted (C<+>). The third hunk says that the C<h> at position 4 of the first sequence should be removed and replaced with the C<f> from position 4 of the second sequence. And so on.

C<diff> may be passed an optional third parameter; this is a CODE reference to a key generation function. See L</KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS>.

Additional parameters, if any, will be passed to the key generation routine.

=head2 C<sdiff>

```

@sdiffs = sdiff( \@seq1, \@seq2 );
$sdiffs_ref = sdiff( \@seq1, \@seq2 );

```

C<sdiff>

computes all necessary components to show two sequences and their minimized differences side by side, just like the Unix-utility I<sdiff> does:

```

same      same
before |  after
old      <  -
-       >  new

```

It returns a list of array refs, each pointing to an array of display instructions. In scalar context it returns a reference to such a list. If there are no differences, the list will have one entry per item, each indicating that the item was unchanged.

Display instructions consist of three elements: A modifier indicator (C<+>: Element added, C<->: Element removed, C<u>: Element unmodified, C<c>: Element changed) and the value of the old and new elements, to

be displayed side-by-side.

An `C<sdiff>` of the following two sequences:

```
a b c e h j l m n p
b c d e f j k l m r s t
```

results in

```
( [ '-', 'a', " ],
  [ 'u', 'b', 'b' ],
  [ 'u', 'c', 'c' ],
  [ '+', " ", 'd' ],
  [ 'u', 'e', 'e' ],
  [ 'c', 'h', 'f' ],
  [ 'u', 'j', 'j' ],
  [ '+', " ", 'k' ],
  [ 'u', 'l', 'l' ],
  [ 'u', 'm', 'm' ],
  [ 'c', 'n', 'r' ],
  [ 'c', 'p', 's' ],
  [ '+', " ", 't' ],
)
```

`C<sdiff>` may be passed an optional third parameter; this is a CODE reference to a key generation function. See `L</KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS>`.

Additional parameters, if any, will be passed to the key generation routine.

`=head2 C<compact_diff>`

`C<compact_diff>` is much like `C<sdiff>` except it returns a much more compact description consisting of just one flat list of indices. An example helps explain the format:

The 0th, 2nd, 4th, etc. entries are all indices into @seq1 (@a in the above example) indicating where a hunk begins. The 1st, 3rd, 5th, etc. entries are all indices into @seq2 (@b in the above example) indicating where the same hunk begins.

So each pair of indices (except the last pair) describes where a hunk begins (in each sequence). Since each hunk must end at the item just before the item that starts the next hunk, the next pair of indices can be used to determine where the hunk ends.

So, the first 4 entries (0..3) describe the first hunk. Entries 0 and 1 describe where the first hunk begins (and so are always both 0). Entries 2 and 3 describe where the next hunk begins, so subtracting 1 from each tells us where the first hunk ends. That is, the first hunk contains items

$C\langle\text{\$diff}[0]\rangle$ through $C\langle\text{\$diff}[2] - 1\rangle$ of the first sequence and contains items $C\langle\text{\$diff}[1]\rangle$ through $C\langle\text{\$diff}[3] - 1\rangle$ of the second sequence.

In other words, the first hunk consists of the following two lists of items:

```

# 1st pair  2nd pair
# of indices of indices
@list1 = @a[ \$cdiff[0] .. \$cdiff[2]-1 ];
@list2 = @b[ \$cdiff[1] .. \$cdiff[3]-1 ];
# Hunk start  Hunk end

```

Note that the hunks will always alternate between those that are part of the LCS (those that contain unchanged items) and those that contain changes. This means that all we need to be told is whether the first hunk is a 'same' or 'diff' hunk and we can determine which of the other hunks contain 'same' items or 'diff' items.

By convention, we always make the first hunk contain unchanged items. So the 1st, 3rd, 5th, etc. hunks (all odd-numbered hunks if you start counting from 1) all contain unchanged items. And the 2nd, 4th, 6th, etc. hunks (all even-numbered hunks if you start counting from 1) all contain changed items.

Since @a and @b don't begin with the same value, the first hunk in our example is empty (otherwise we'd violate the above convention). Note that the first 4 index values in our example are all zero. Plug these values into our previous code block and we get:

```
@hunk1a = @a[ 0 .. 0-1 ];  
@hunk1b = @b[ 0 .. 0-1 ];
```

And C<0..-1> returns the empty list.

Move down one pair of indices (2..5) and we get the offset ranges for the second hunk, which contains changed items.

Since C<@diff[2..5]> contains (0,0,1,0) in our example, the second hunk consists of these two lists of items:

```
@hunk2a = @a[ $cdiff[2] .. $cdiff[4]-1 ];

That is, we would delete item 0 ('a') from @a.

Since C<@diff[4..7]> contains (1,0,3,2) in our example, the third hunk consists of these two lists of items:

Note that this third hunk contains unchanged items as our convention demands.

You can continue this process until you reach the last two indices, which will always be the number of items in each sequence. This is required so that subtracting one from each will give you the indices to the last items in each sequence.

=head2 C<traverse_sequences>
```

C<traverse_sequences> used to be the most general facility provided by this module (the new OO interface is more powerful and much easier to use).

Imagine that there are two arrows. Arrow A points to an element of sequence A, and arrow B points to an element of the sequence B. Initially, the arrows point to the first elements of the respective sequences. C<traverse_sequences> will advance the arrows through the sequences one element at a time, calling an appropriate user-specified callback function before each advance. It will advance the arrows in such a way that if there are equal elements C<\$A[\$i]> and C<\$B[\$j]> which are equal and which are part of the LCS, there will be some moment during the execution of C<traverse_sequences> when arrow A is pointing to C<\$A[\$i]> and arrow B is pointing to C<\$B[\$j]>. When this happens, C<traverse_sequences> will call the C<MATCH> callback function and then it will advance both arrows.

Otherwise, one of the arrows is pointing to an element of its sequence that is not part of the LCS. C<traverse_sequences> will advance that arrow and will call the C<DISCARD_A> or the C<DISCARD_B> callback, depending on which arrow it advanced. If both arrows point to elements that are not part of the LCS, then C<traverse_sequences> will advance one of them and call the appropriate callback, but it is not specified which it will call.

The arguments to C<traverse_sequences> are the two sequences to traverse, and a hash which specifies the callback functions, like this:

```
traverse_sequences(

    DISCARD_B => $callback_3,

Callbacks for MATCH, DISCARD_A, and DISCARD_B are invoked with at least the indices of the two arrows as their arguments. They are not expected to return any values. If a callback is omitted from the table, it is

not called.

Callbacks for A_FINISHED and B_FINISHED are invoked with at least the corresponding index in A or B.

If arrow A reaches the end of its sequence, before arrow B does, C<traverse_sequences> will call the C<A_FINISHED> callback when it advances arrow B, if there is such a function; if not it will call C<DISCARD_B> instead. Similarly if arrow B finishes first. C<traverse_sequences> returns when both arrows are at the ends of their respective sequences. It returns true on success and false on failure. At present there is no way to fail.

C<traverse_sequences> may be passed an optional fourth parameter; this is a CODE reference to a key generation function. See L</KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS>.

Additional parameters, if any, will be passed to the key generation function.

If you want to pass additional parameters to your callbacks, but don't need a custom key generation function, you can get the default by passing undef:

C<traverse_sequences> does not have a useful return value; you are expected to plug in the appropriate behavior with the callback functions.

=head2 C<traverse_balanced>

C<traverse_balanced> is an alternative to C<traverse_sequences>. It uses a different algorithm to iterate through the entries in the computed LCS. Instead of sticking to one side and showing element changes as insertions and deletions only, it will jump back and forth between the two sequences and report I<changes> occurring as deletions on one

side followed immediately by an insertion on the other side.

In addition to the C<DISCARD_A>, C<DISCARD_B>, and C<MATCH> callbacks supported by C<traverse_sequences>, C<traverse_balanced> supports a C<CHANGE> callback indicating that one element got C<replaced> by another:

If no C<CHANGE> callback is specified, C<traverse_balanced> will map C<CHANGE> events to C<DISCARD_A> and C<DISCARD_B> actions, therefore resulting in a similar behaviour as C<traverse_sequences> with different order of events.

C<traverse_balanced> might be a bit slower than C<traverse_sequences>, noticeable only while processing huge amounts of data.

The C<sdiff> function of this module is implemented as call to C<traverse_balanced>.

C<traverse_balanced> does not have a useful return value; you are expected to plug in the appropriate behavior with the callback functions.

=head1 KEY GENERATION FUNCTIONS

Most of the functions accept an optional extra parameter. This is a CODE reference to a key generating (hashing) function that should return a string that uniquely identifies a given element. It should be the case that if two elements are to be considered equal, their keys should be the same (and the other way around). If no key generation function is provided, the key will be the element as a string.

By default, comparisons will use "eq" and elements will be turned into keys using the default stringizing operator "".

Where this is important is when you're comparing something other than strings. If it is the case that you have multiple different objects that should be considered to be equal, you should supply a key generation function. Otherwise, you have to make sure that your arrays contain unique references.

For instance, consider this example:

everything would work out OK (each of the objects would be converted into a string like "Person=HASH(0x82425b0)" for comparison).

But if you did this:

`$person4` and `$person4->clone()` (which have the same name and SSN) would be seen as different objects. If you wanted them to be considered equivalent, you would have to pass in a key generation function:

This would use the 'ssn' field in each Person as a comparison key, and so would consider \$person4 and \$person4->clone() as equal.

You may also pass additional parameters to the key generation function if you wish.

<p>This SQLite Consortium Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the ____ day of _____, 2007 ("Effective Date") by and between _____ (the "Company"), and Hipp, Wyrick & Company, Inc., a Georgia Corporation with headquarters at 6200 Maple Cove Lane, Charlotte, NC ("Hwaci").</p>

<p>WHEREAS, Hwaci is the developer of a serverless, embeddable, public domain SQL database engine available at http://www.sqlite.org/ ("SQLite"); and</p>

<p>WHEREAS, Company wishes to support the independent development of the SQLite database engine to insure the continuing reliability, vitality, and independence of SQLite, and in connection therewith, Company wishes to provide funds for ongoing research, development, and maintenance of the SQLite code base, operation of the SQLite website, protection and maintenance of the SQLite trademark, as well as for promotion of SQLite at conferences and trade shows; and</p>

<p>WHEREAS, Company wishes to receive benefits in the form of services from Hwaci in consideration for their support of SQLite; and

<p>WHEREAS, Company and Hwaci each wish SQLite to be supported and maintained as an independent, community-driven project, and to ensure the SQLite development team remains independent.</p>

<p>NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:</p>

<h2>1.0 Definitions</h2>

<h3>1.1 SQLite Developers</h3>

<p>The "SQLite Developers" are the employees or contractors of Hwaci engaged in the development of SQLite, including without limitation the SQLite Architect.</p>

<h3>1.2 SQLite Architect</h3>

<p>The "SQLite Architect" is the SQLite Developer with ultimate responsibility and authority over changes and maintenance of the SQLite code. The current SQLite Architect is the original designer and developer of SQLite, D. Richard Hipp. Hwaci may change the SQLite Architect from time to time upon approval by Company.</p>

<h3>1.3 Consortium Member</h3>

<p>A "Consortium Member" is a company or organization, including but not limited to Company, which has entered into an agreement with Hwaci which is substantially similar to this Agreement.</p>

<h2>2.0 Agreement</h2>

<h3>2.1 Responsibilities And Obligations Of SQLite Developers</h3>

<h4>2.1.1 General Support</h4>

<p>The SQLite Developers shall provide, without limit, timely and accurate answers, advice, and instruction in response to questions and comments from Company about SQLite submitted by email or by telephone at any time day or night.</p>

<h4>2.1.2 Debugging Support</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall at Company's request provide Company with direct assistance in debugging applications that are built upon or use SQLite. The combined time for Debugging Support and Custom Development for Company is limited to 330 hours per year.</p>

<h4>2.1.3 Custom Development</h4>

<p>The SQLite Developers shall at the request of Company write new extensions or enhancements to SQLite according to Company's specifications. These extensions and enhancements may be proprietary to Company or open source or with the consent of both Company and the SQLite Architect may be folded into the public domain SQLite source tree. The time devoted to Custom Development for Company is limited 220 hours per year.</p>

<h4>2.1.4 Custom Builds</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall at Company's request provide Company with specialized builds of SQLite according to Company's specifications.

<h4>2.1.5 Legacy Support</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall at Company's request provide support and bug-fix patches for any historical version of SQLite.

<h4>2.1.6 Custom Testing</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall at Company's request set up and run acceptance tests according to Company's specifications that are specifically designed to exercise SQLite as configured and used by Company. These acceptance tests shall be run and shall pass prior to any release of SQLite.

<h4>2.1.7 Priority Bug Fixes</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall assign highest priority to fixing bugs in SQLite that are reported by Company or in which Company has expressed a specific interest.

<h4>2.1.8 Code Quality</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall at all times keep the SQLite source code well commented and documented and clearly structured and organized so that an experienced and competent programmer can understand it and support it after no more than a few months of study.

<h4>2.1.9 Backwards Compatibility</h4>

The SQLite Developers recognize that Company uses SQLite in mission-critical applications and therefore shall work diligently to ensure continuing bug-free correct operation and backwards compatibility with prior releases.

<h4>2.1.10 Test Coverage</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall maintain the SQLite test suite such that no less than 95% source code coverage is provided.

<h4>2.1.11 Website</h4>

The SQLite Developers shall maintain the SQLite website at

<http://www.sqlite.org/>
in good working order and all SQLite source code shall
be made freely available at such website.

2.2 Responsibilities And Obligations Of The SQLite Architect

2.2.1 Private Briefings

The SQLite Architect shall, at the request of Company,
provide Company with private notification and briefings
of any new bugs or new features in SQLite that might
effect Company's products.

2.2.2 Direction

The SQLite Architect shall coordinate the activities of SQLite
Developers and shall publish from time to time a roadmap of
proposed future changes and enhancements to SQLite.

2.2.3 Oversight

The SQLite Architect shall personally
review all changes to
the SQLite Source Code and take responsibility for the quality
and correctness of those changes.

2.2.4 Continuity

The initial SQLite Architect shall be the original developer
of SQLite, D. Richard Hipp. The role of SQLite Architect shall
not be assigned to another during the term of this Agreement except
due to the disability of Dr. Hipp and with approval of Company.

2.3 Responsibilities And Obligations Of Hwaci

2.3.1 Employer

Hwaci shall act as the employer of the SQLite Developers and
SQLite Architect and shall make all tax and legal filings
and tax withholding required by employers. Hwaci shall provide
Company with W-9 information upon request.

2.3.2 Responsible Party

All obligations of the SQLite Developers set forth in this
agreement are deemed obligations of Hwaci. Hwaci shall recruit,
employ, and supervise SQLite Developers in such a way that the

responsibilities and obligations of the SQLite

Developers set

forth in this agreement are upheld.

2.3.3 Multiple Developers

Hwaci shall recruit and employ as many SQLite Developers for as many hours as can be reasonably achieved using the funds received from Consortium Members under this agreement.

So that support for SQLite will not be interrupted by the disability or withdrawal of any one SQLite Developer, Hwaci will keep at least two knowledgeable and competent SQLite Developers on staff.

2.3.4 Mentorship

Hwaci shall work to encourage independent programmers from around the world to become familiar with SQLite internals so that there will be a pool of talent able to support SQLite in the future.

2.3.5 Audits

Hwaci shall keep and maintain complete and accurate records of the use of development funds provided by Company and shall allow Company, or its representative, a certified public accountant mutually acceptable to Hwaci and Company, during office hours and at reasonable intervals, no more than once every 12 months, to inspect and make extracts or copies of such records solely for the purpose of ascertaining Hwaci's compliance with the objectives and requirements of this agreement.

2.3.6 Disaster Planning

Hwaci shall maintain backup copies of all SQLite source files and documentation, current and historical, at at least two separate locations separated from each other and from the primary on-line SQLite repository by at least 400 kilometers.

2.3.7 Trademark

Hwaci shall maintain ownership of the SQLite trademark and the sqlite.org domain name and shall purchase bandwidth and server space for the <http://www.sqlite.org/> website.

2.3.8 No Take-overs or Buy-outs

<p>Neither Hwaci nor the SQLite Architect shall relinquish development control of SQLite during the term of this Agreement, by acquisition or merger or by any other means, except with the consent of Company.</p>

<p>New Consortium Members may be accepted into the consortium from time to time under identical terms as this agreement, or under substantially similar terms that have been approved by existing Consortium Members.</p>

Hwaci shall recruit and employ a sufficient number of qualified SQLite Developers to easily cover all custom development, debugging, and general support service obligations for all Consortium Members while still providing ample time for the SQLite Developers to engage in general maintenance and extension of SQLite.</p>

<h4>2.3.11 Use Of Funds</h4>

<p>Hwaci shall use the funds provided hereunder solely for the development and maintenance of SQLite as set forth in this Agreement.</p>

Interest on funds received in advance and held in trust will be reinvested and used for the same purposes as the principal.</p>

<h3>2.4 Responsibilities And Obligations Of Company</h3>

<h4>2.4.1 Funding</h4>

<h3>4.1 Definition of Confidential Information</h3>

<p>"Confidential Information" means any Company proprietary information, technical data, trade secrets or know-how, including, but not limited to, research, product plans, products, services, customers, customer lists, markets, software, developments, inventions, processes, formulas, technology, designs, drawings, engineering, hardware configuration information, marketing, finances or other business information disclosed by Company either directly or indirectly in writing, orally or by drawings or inspection of parts or equipment.</p>

<h3>4.2 Non-Use and Non-Disclosure.</h3>

<p>Hwaci shall not, during or subsequent to the term of this Agreement, use Company's Confidential Information for any purpose whatsoever other than the performance of the Services or disclose Company's Confidential Information to any third party. The parties acknowledge that Confidential Information will remain the sole property of Company. Hwaci shall take all reasonable precautions to prevent any unauthorized disclosure of Confidential Information including, but not limited to, having each employee or consultant of Hwaci, if any, with access to any Confidential Information, execute a nondisclosure agreement containing provisions in Company's favor substantially similar to this Agreement. Confidential Information does not include information that: (i) is known to Hwaci at the time of disclosure to Hwaci by Company as evidenced by written records of Hwaci; (ii) has become publicly known and made generally available through no wrongful act of Hwaci; or (iii) has been received by Hwaci from a third party who is authorized to make such disclosure.</p>

<h4>4.2.1 Disclosure Required by Law</h4>

In the event any Confidential Information is required to be disclosed by Hwaci under the terms of a valid and effective subpoena or order issued by a court of competent jurisdiction, or by a demand or information request from an executive or administrative agency or other governmental authority, Hwaci shall, unless prohibited by the terms of a subpoena, order, or demand, promptly notify

Company of the existence, terms and circumstances surrounding such demand or request, shall consult with Company on the advisability of taking legally available steps to resist or narrow such demand or request, and, if disclosure of such Confidential Information is required, shall exercise its reasonable best efforts to narrow the scope of disclosure and obtain an order or other reliable assurance that confidential treatment will be accorded to such Confidential Information. To the extent that Hwaci is prohibited from notifying Company of a subpoena, order or demand, by the terms of same, Hwaci shall exercise its reasonable efforts to narrow the scope of disclosure.</p>

<h3>4.3 Return of Materials.</h3>

<p>Upon the termination of this Agreement, or upon Company's earlier request, Hwaci shall deliver to Company all of Company's property or Confidential Information that Hwaci may have in Hwaci's possession or control.</p>

<h2>5.0 Intellectual Property</h2>

<h3>5.1 No Assignment</h3>

<p>Company acknowledges that all copyrightable material, notes, records, drawings, designs, inventions, improvements, developments, discoveries and trade secrets made, generated, conceived, or reduced to practice by Hwaci related to SQLite will remain the property of Hwaci. Nothing in this Agreement will be construed to transfer any intellectual property right of Hwaci to Company.</p>

<h3>5.2 Availability and Public Domain Dedication</h3>

<p>The SQLite Developers and Hwaci shall, subject to their discretion as to the quality and suitability of the SQLite source code and documentation for public release, make the SQLite source code and documentation publicly available as downloadable files and make a public statement ceding all intellectual property rights, including but not limited to copyright and patent rights, in the SQLite source code and documentation to the public domain. To the extent that the SQLite Developers and Hwaci elect not to release the SQLite

source code and documentation publicly, they shall provide copies thereof to Company and hereby grants to Company, under all of the SQLite Developers' and Hwaci's rights including but not limited to copyright and patent rights, in and to the SQLite source code and documentation, perpetual, irrevocable, worldwide, non-exclusive, sublicenseable license to use, copy, prepare derivative works of, publicly perform and display the SQLite source code and documentation and derivative works thereof.</p>

<h3>5.3 Trademark</h3>

<p>Hwaci shall use the name "SQLite" only to apply to the publicly available project known by such name as of the Effective Date. Hwaci may in its discretion file such trademark applications or registrations as it deems appropriate to protect or record its rights therein, and may set such policies as it deems appropriate for licensing the use of the trademark.</p>

<h2>6.0 Representations And Warranties</h2>

<h3>6.1 Intellectual Property Clearances.</h3>

<p>Hwaci hereby represents and warrants that Hwaci shall enter into agreements with the SQLite Developers sufficient to enable Hwaci to undertake the obligations of Section 5.</p>

<h3>6.2 Disclaimer.</h3>

<p>THE WORK PRODUCT AND ALL MATERIAL PROVIDED BY HWACI AND COMPANY ARE PROVIDED "AS IS." NEITHER PARTY MAKES ANY REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES OF ANY KIND, WHETHER ORAL OR WRITTEN, WHETHER EXPRESS, IMPLIED, OR ARISING BY STATUTE, CUSTOM, COURSE OF DEALING OR TRADE USAGE, WITH RESPECT TO THE SUBJECT MATTER HEREOF, IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT. EACH PARTY SPECIFICALLY DISCLAIMS ANY AND ALL IMPLIED WARRANTIES OR CONDITIONS OF TITLE, MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, AND NON-INFRINGEMENT.</p>

<h2>7.0 Term And Termination</h2>

<h3>7.1 Term.</h3>

<p>This Agreement will commence on the Effective Date and will continue until 12 months after the Effective Date. Thereafter, the parties may by mutual consent renew this Agreement subject to agreement on fees to be paid by Company for sponsorship for additional periods.</p>

<h3>7.2 Termination.</h3>

<p>If either party materially defaults in the performance of any of its material obligations hereunder and if any such default is not corrected within 30 days after notice in writing, then the non-defaulting party, at its option, may, in addition to any other remedies it may have, thereupon terminate this Agreement by giving written notice of termination to the defaulting party.</p>

<h3>7.3 Survival.</h3>

<p>Upon such termination all rights and duties of the parties toward each other will cease except: Sections 4 (Confidentiality), 5 (Intellectual Property), and 8 (Miscellaneous) will survive termination of this Agreement.</p>

Roundoff Error By default, coordinates are stored in an R*Tree using 32-bit floating point values. When a coordinate cannot be exactly represented by a 32-bit floating point number, the lower-bound coordinates are

rounded down and the upper-bound coordinates are rounded up. Thus, bounding boxes might be slightly larger than specified, but will never be any smaller. This is exactly what is desired for doing the more common "overlapping" queries where the application

wants to find every entry in the R*Tree that overlaps a query bounding box. Rounding the entry bounding boxes outward might cause a few extra entries to appear in an overlapping query if the edge of the entry bounding box corresponds to an edge of the query bounding box. But the overlapping query will never miss a valid table entry. However, for a "contained-within" style query, rounding the bounding boxes outward might cause some entries to be excluded from the result set if the edge of the entry bounding box corresponds to the edge of the query bounding box. To guard against this, applications should expand their contained-within query boxes slightly (by 0.000012%) by rounding down the lower coordinates and rounding up the top coordinates, in each dimension.

3.5. Reading And Writing At The Same Time

It is the nature of the Guttman R-Tree algorithm that any write might radically restructure the tree, and in the process change the scan order of the nodes. For this reason, it is not generally possible to modify the R-Tree in the middle of a query of the R-Tree. Attempts to do so will fail with a `SQLITE_LOCKED` "database table is locked" error. So, for example, suppose an application runs one query against an R-Tree like this: `SELECT id FROM demo_index WHERE maxY >= 35.0 AND minY <= 35.0`; Then for each "id" value returned, suppose the application creates an `UPDATE` statement like the following and binds the "id" value returned against the "?1" parameter: `UPDATE demo_index SET maxY = maxY + 0.5 WHERE id = ?1`; Then the `UPDATE` might fail with an `SQLITE_LOCKED` error. The reason is that the initial query has not run to completion. It is remembering its place in the middle of a scan of the R-Tree. So an update to the R-Tree cannot be tolerated as this would disrupt the scan. It is also possible to express this kind of simultaneous read and write on an R-Tree within a single query, for example if an `UPDATE` statement tries to change the value of one row of the R-Tree based on a complicated

query from another row of the same R-Tree, perhaps something like this: `UPDATE demo_index SET maxY = (SELECT max(maxX) FROM demo_index AS x2 WHERE x2.maxY > demo_index.x2) WHERE maxY >= 35.0 AND minY <= 35.0`; This is a limitation of the R-Tree extension only. Ordinary tables in SQLite are able to read and write at the same time. Other virtual tables might (or might not) also that capability. And R-Tree can appear to read and write at the same time in some circumstances, if it can figure out how to reliably run the query to completion before starting the update. But you shouldn't count on that for every query. Generally speaking, it is best to avoid running queries and updates to the same R-Tree at the same time. If you really need to update an R-Tree based on complex queries against the same R-Tree, it is best to run the complex queries first and store the results in a temporary table, then update the R-Tree based on the values stored in the temporary table.

4. Using R*Trees Effectively

For SQLite versions prior to 3.24.0 (2018-06-04), the only information that an R*Tree index stores about an object is its integer ID and its bounding box. Additional information needs to be stored in separate tables and related to the R*Tree index using the primary key. For the example above, one might create an auxiliary table as follows: `CREATE TABLE demo_data(id INTEGER PRIMARY KEY, -- primary key objname TEXT, -- name of the object objtype TEXT, -- object type boundary BLOB -- detailed boundary of object);` In this example, the `demo_data.boundary` field is intended to hold some kind of binary representation of the precise boundaries of the object. The R*Tree index only holds an axis-aligned rectangular boundary for the object. The R*Tree boundary is just an approximation of the true object boundary. So what typically happens is that the R*Tree index is used to narrow a search down to a list of candidate objects and then more detailed and expensive computations are done on each candidate

to find if the candidate truly meets the search criteria. Key Point: An R*Tree index does not normally provide the exact answer but merely reduces the set of potential answers from millions to dozens. Suppose the `demo_data.boundary` field holds some proprietary data description of a complex two-dimensional boundary for an object and suppose that the application has used the `sqlite3_create_function()` interface to create application-defined functions "contained_in" and "overlaps" accepting two `demo_data.boundary` objects and return true or false. One may assume that "contained_in" and "overlaps" are relatively slow functions that we do not want to invoke too frequently. Then an efficient way to find the name of all objects located within the North Carolina 12th District, one

may be to run a query like this: `SELECT objname FROM demo_data, demo_index WHERE demo_data.id=demo_index.id AND contained_in(demo_data.boundary, :boundary) AND minX>=-81.0 AND maxX<=-79.6 AND minY>=35.0 AND maxY>=36.2;`

In the query above, one would presumably bind the binary BLOB description of the precise boundary of the 12th district to the ":boundary" parameter. Notice how the query above works: The R*Tree index runs in the outer loop to find entries that are contained within the bounding box of longitude -81..-79.6 and latitude 35.0..36.2. For each object identifier found, SQLite looks up the corresponding entry in the demo_data table. It then uses the boundary field from the demo_data table as a parameter to the contained_in() function and if that function returns true, the objname field from the demo_data table is returned as the next row of query result. One would get the same answer without the use of the R*Tree index using the following simpler query: `SELECT objname FROM demo_data WHERE contained_in(demo_data.boundary, :boundary);` The problem with this latter query is that it must apply the contained_in() function to millions of entries in the demo_data table. The use of the R*Tree

in the penultimate query reduces the number of calls to contained_in() function to a small subset of the entire table. The R*Tree index did not find the exact answer itself, it merely limited the search space.

4.1. Auxiliary Columns

Beginning with SQLite version 3.24.0 (2018-06-04), r-tree tables can have auxiliary columns that store arbitrary data. Auxiliary columns can be used in place of secondary tables such as "demo_data". Auxiliary columns are marked with a "+" symbol before the column name. Auxiliary columns must come after all of the coordinate boundary columns. There is a limit of no more than 100 auxiliary columns.
